FROM THE PRINCIPAL

COVID UPDATE

You may be aware that the Victorian Government has announced changes to the COVID-19 isolation requirements.

This means that from 11.59pm on Wednesday 12 October, the mandatory orders around isolation for people with COVID-19 have ended and instead we move to health advice and recommendations for people with COVID-19 or COVID-19-like symptoms. Our school will continue to adhere to the Department of Health's recommendations to ensure that our school remains a safe environment for our staff and students.

The Department of Health strongly recommends that students and school staff:

- Who test positive to COVID-19 stay home and isolate for 5 days and do not attend school after 5 days if they are still symptomatic
- Who are symptomatic but have not tested positive not attend school. This does not include students with pre-existing conditions such as hay fever.
- Parents and carers are recommended to continue to report their child having COVID-19 to both the school and the Department of Health.

We will, however, no longer report occurrences of positive cases to the school community. We ask parents and carers to continue to remain vigilant in preventing COVID-19 transmission. Any student who is unwell should continue to remain at home. This is about keeping students healthy and well in our school and reducing the spread of both COVID-19 and other respiratory diseases. Free rapid antigen tests are available at the school for those who need them. Parents and carers will be contacted if their child shows symptoms while at school. Students who wish to wear a mask should continue to do so.

To keep our school as safe as possible, we will also continue to use air purifiers and other COVID-19 prevention measures. Thanks for your continued efforts to keep our school community safe and well.

CLASS PLACEMENT 2023

Thank you to the parents who have taken the time to write to me regarding information or concerns they may have over their child's class placement for 2023. A reminder, the final date to send a letter to me on this issue is next Thursday, October 27, 2022 at 4pm. Please refer to the guidelines I sent out in the last newsletter regarding what requests will be taken into account. Requests for specific teachers will not be considered.

2023 PARENT CONTRIBUTIONS

At School Council on Tuesday night, we passed the Parent Contributions for 2023. These will be sent out to you through Compass next week.

In the past 2 years, there has been changes to the Parent Payment Policy as set by the Department of Education.

Why are parent payment arrangements different now?

To ensure consistency in the way parent contributions are being requested and managed across the state, the Department has made changes to how schools seek parent contributions. The intent is to align practices across the system, and ensure parents and schools use common terminology and have a shared understanding around parent payment arrangements.

A template is being used by all schools to communicate parent payment arrangements. The template includes the new category names to clearly define the purpose of parent payment requests and includes a one-page overview of the policy.

Parent Payment Categories

The categories under which contributions will be requested have been changed to align with the purpose of the payment:

- ◇ Support items and activities that help deliver fundamental curriculum or subject learning e.g. General classroom materials and equipment
- ◇ Other Contributions (previously known as Voluntary Contributions) support the school's operation and function more generally e.g. Parent communication tools and school building enhancements
- ◇ Payments for Extra-Curricular Items and Activities (previously known as Optional Items) provide for items and activities over and above what is needed to deliver fundamental curriculum learning. These user-pays contributions enhance the schooling experience for students e.g. Optional camps, excursions and events

The change in Parent Contributions policy as set by the State Government was to address schools that were non-compliant in their fee charging. We have always been compliant and when you see what we are requesting, our fees will show little difference to what has been in place since the policy last changed 5 years ago. The change is the Department have now made Curriculum Contributions (previously known as Essential Student Learning Items) voluntary.

With our incredibly low fees since the change in policy 5 years ago, you will know the incredible value for money you receive as families for the education and opportunities your children get at Tecoma Primary School.

We ask that you continue to support us financially in the magnificent way you have in the past. The voluntary contributions that we have received, in some years totalling \$20,000, has enabled us to buy items such as iPads and laptops as well as the new interactive televisions we are bringing in across the school.

We thank you for your ongoing support of the school, not just physically with your attendance and support of your children, but also financially. We can only run the programs and structures we have, through having a supportive community.

UPDATE CONTACT DETAILS

With fire season fast approaching it is a good time to remind our families to ensure that all your details are up to date at the school. If you have changed address, got a new phone number or have a new alternative contact please contact the office to give us the details so that we are able to contact you if required.

GRADE SIX GRADUATION

Preparations have begun for our Grade 6 Graduation on December 15. We hold the graduation ceremony at Burrinja before we head to the Upwey/Belgrave RSL for a meal. Information will be sent home on a regular basis and your children will be kept informed of developments as they occur.

The Grade 6 students are also preparing for the next phase of their education. It is an exciting time for them with many changes occurring as they progress through to Secondary College. Discuss the transition with your child in a positive way to ensure that the transition is a smooth one. Should you have any concerns please speak to your child's teacher at the school.

IS YOUR CHILD STARTING SECONDARY SCHOOL NEXT YEAR?

Parents of our Grade 6 students will tell you that it doesn't seem that long ago that their child was starting school. The primary years seem to fly by and our grade 6's are already three weeks into their final term of primary school.

Secondary school can be a daunting thought for not only our students but parents as well. There are many questions, which I'm sure you have, which are not fully answered at information nights and orientation days.

The Department of Education and Training have developed an informative site, which provides hints and tips on how to support your child through the transition to secondary school.

I have taken the following from the site:

Children starting secondary school (year 7)

Moving from primary school to secondary school is a major step. It's a time of big changes in your child's life.

Talking about the changes with your child will help make the move positive.

What's different? Some of the main differences between primary and secondary school are:

- ◆ more subjects and teachers
- ◆ more homework
- ◆ more challenging school work
- ◆ the responsibility of getting to classes in different rooms on time
- ◆ the need to manage themselves, their learning and their equipment
- ◆ using lockers and carrying books between classes
- ◆ adapting to different teaching styles
- ◆ having no 'home' classroom – many schools have a designated area for year 7 students.

Many secondary schools work with primary schools to make the move easier. These transition programs can include:

- ◆ secondary students giving talks at their old primary school
- ◆ year 6 classes visiting secondary schools
- ◆ buddy systems at secondary schools – these pair up older and younger students.
- ◆ orientation days – these usually happen in early December.

Tips to prepare during the school holidays:

1. Be positive and enthusiastic. Your child is more likely to look forward to starting high school if you're positive about it.
2. Organise the school uniform. Your child should wear their new school shoes around the house to make sure they are comfortable
3. Get books and stationery. The school will give you a book list.
4. Learn about school routines. What time does school start and finish, what time is recess and lunchtime?
5. Learn about travel to school. Make a plan around the public transport timetable. Have a backup plan in case they miss public transport. If you plan to drive your child to school, do a trial drop off and pick up, and check for parking.
6. Talk to your child about their timetable. It will list subjects and classroom numbers. It's good to make a few copies of the timetable to keep in different places.
7. Create a comfortable place for your child to study. This should be a quiet place away from distractions.

8. Remind your child that it is normal to feel nervous about starting high school. These nerves may last past the first day. Encourage your child to talk about what they might be worried about.
9. Encourage your child to keep in touch with their primary school friends.
10. Have an emergency safety plan. Be clear about who your child should contact and what you expect them to do in an emergency.

PUPIL FREE DAYS NEXT TERM AND THE BEGINNING OF 2023

As mentioned in the last newsletter of Term 3 and at the beginning of this term, we let parents know that we have three days this term to be utilised as Pupil Free Days. These are the remaining 2 of the 4 curriculum days allocated per year and the Term 4 Professional Practice Day (PPD) as part of Victorian Government Schools Agreement.

- Professional Practice Day on Friday October 28
- Pupil Free Day on Monday December 19
- Pupil Free Day on Tuesday December 20

The final day of 2022 for all children is Friday December 16 with our final assembly and farewell to our Grade 6 children from 2:30-3:30pm that day.

PARENT PAYMENTS POLICY

ONE PAGE OVERVIEW



FREE INSTRUCTION

- Schools provide students with free instruction and ensure students have free access to all items, activities and services that are used by the school to fulfil the standard curriculum requirements in Victorian Curriculum F-10, VCE and VCAL.
- Schools may invite parents to make a financial contribution to support the school.



PARENT PAYMENT REQUESTS

Schools can request contributions from parents under three categories:

Curriculum Contributions

Voluntary financial contributions for curriculum items and activities which the school deems necessary for students to learn the Curriculum.

Other Contributions

Voluntary financial contributions for non-curriculum items and activities that relate to the school's functions and objectives.

Extra-Curricular Items and Activities

Items and activities that enhance or broaden the schooling experience of students and are above and beyond what the school provides for free to deliver the Curriculum. These are provided on a user-pays basis.

- Schools may also invite parents to supply or purchase educational items to use and own (e.g. textbooks, stationery, digital devices).



FINANCIAL HELP FOR FAMILIES

- Schools put in place financial hardship arrangements to support families who cannot pay for items or activities so that their child doesn't miss out.
- Schools have a nominated parent payment contact person(s) that parents can have a confidential discussion with regarding financial hardship arrangements.



SCHOOL PROCESSES

- Schools must obtain school council approval for their parent payment arrangements and publish all requests and communications for each year level on their school website for transparency.
