### FORTNIGHTLY UPDATE

We have enjoyed a really busy fortnight around the school with incursions, excursions, Smile Squad dental service, Grade 3/4 classes starting their swimming program, Mother's Day stall as well as teaching and learning in the classroom.

### **REPORTS**

Term 2 provides a timely opportunity to engage with families more formally as we report on Semester 1 achievements that our students have focused on. Reports undertaken as teacher judgements are a considerable piece of work for all teaching staff to moderate, evaluate, award scores and then summarise achievement through written comment. From beginning to end,



this would nearly take 2 hours per student. Noting that this work is always undertaken in addition to a full teaching load which is somewhat alleviated through the Professional Practice Day next week. We do take report writing on achievement with a view to ensure that we can engage with our families as the primary purpose for these documents. This half-year report will be distributed on the 21st of June, with the opportunity to meet with our teaching staff on Tuesday 25th June for Parent -Teacher Interviews. I urge parents to 'save the date' and keep an eye out for the upcoming Compass link to book your allocated time with your child's teacher later this term.

### **PROFESSIONAL PRACTICE DAY: Monday May 20**

A reminder that was in the last edition of the newsletter. As part of the agreement brokered between the State Government and representative bodies, Professional Practice days have been reduced to one each year. This year, schools are required to provide one day for report writing purposes and this date was approved by School Council at the March meeting, last term.

#### **READING IS EVERYTHING!**

As the colder months descend on us and the days get shorter, there is no better time to grab a book and curl up under the doona or in front of the fire. By any measure, reading for more than 15 minutes per day has enormous benefits for life outcomes. Fifteen plus minutes of active reading helps students achieve higher academic growth than their peers. 30 minutes is even better, and 60 minutes has enormous benefits. Studies show that only 18% of students read for 30 minutes per night and that at 60 minutes, student growth is on average 48% higher than the average, no matter what the child's background. The table also shows the correlation between high reading engagement against international student rankings. Those coming from the lowest socioeconomic backgrounds achieve well above the international average if they read regularly. If we compare a student from a low socioeconomic background who does not read daily, with a student from a high background that does, the difference is massive. That difference is cut dramatically by high reading engagement. The evidence could not be clearer. If you want your child to succeed, read to them and give them plenty of opportunities to read. If you still have pre-schoolers, the research shows how significant being read to is, enabling students to start school with reading skills well above their peers. From my own experience, when my own children wanted to stay up later, our first negotiation led to bedtime being extended by 30 minutes, on the proviso that they read in bed for those 30 minutes. Not only did it help them fall asleep as they disconnected from devices, but it boosted their reading time. Win-win! As I have said many, many times, reading is everything and is the key to your child enjoying a successful future.

I have included an article below that further outlines the importance of reading daily.



### WHY READING EVERY NIGHT IS SO IMPORTANT:

The following article again illustrates just how important the practice of reading nightly is.

### Why Can't I Skip My Twenty Minutes of Reading Tonight?

### Let us figure it out -- mathematically!

- Student A reads 20 minutes five nights of every week.
- Student B reads only 4 minutes a night...or not at all!



Step 1: Multiply minutes a night x 5 times each week.

- Student A reads 20 mins x 5 times a week = 100 mins/week.
- Student B reads 4 mins x 5 times a week = 20 minutes.

Step 2: Multiply minutes a week x approximately 4 weeks each month.

- Student A reads 400 minutes a month.
- Student B reads 80 minutes a month.

Step 3: Multiply minutes a month x 9 months/school year.

- Student A reads 3600 mins in a school year.
- Student B reads 720 mins in a school year.
- $\Rightarrow$  Student A practices reading the equivalent of ten whole school days a year.
- $\Rightarrow$  Student B gets the equivalent of only two school days of reading practice.
- $\Rightarrow$  By the end of Year 6 if Student A and Student B maintain these same reading habits, Student A will have read the equivalent of 60 whole school days.
- $\Rightarrow$  Student B will have read the equivalent of only 12 school days.

One would expect the gap of information retained will have widened considerably and so, undoubtedly, will school performance.

How do you think Student B will feel about him/herself as a student?

### Some questions to ponder:

Which student would you expect to be the more proficient reader? Which student would you expect to know more? Which student would you expect to write with greater proficiency? Which student would you expect to have a broader vocabulary? Which student would you expect to be more successful in school....and in life?
